Successful projects with Ulster's participation

MIDAS Meaningful Integration of Data, Analytics and Services

- Awarded over €4.5 million
- Led by Ulster University
- Aims to develop a digital platform for healthcare policy makers
- Allows decision-makers to engage with healthcare data to better inform policy, reduce costs and improve health and wellbeing of the population
- Will bring together numerous stakeholders to investigate connecting patient data from European health authorities, with individual data collected from apps, sensors and social media

CONTEXT Collaborative Network for Training and Expertise in PsychoTraumatology

- Awarded €1,093,151.52
- Aims to conduct high quality, innovative research, build capacity and expertise, and foster innovative practice in the area of global psychotraumatology.
- Allows twelve doctoral researchers to study the psychological effects of exposure to traumatic life events amongst groups including refugees, asylum seekers and migrants who have entered Europe from conflict zones
- Ulster University is a partner in this project led by Trinity College Dublin



Over €23 million has been offered to Ulster University, under the EU's INTERREG VA
Programme, for three truly innovative projects within the fields of Health & Life
Science and Renewable Energy.

Ulster's participation in INTERREG projects

CPM: Centre for Personalised Medicine, Clinical Decision Making and Patient Safety	Aim to establish a Centre for Personalised Medicine; Clinical Decision Making and Patient Safety (CPM) which will enhance the regional capability while serving as a magnet for regional and FDI industry to create innovative products and new optimised care pathway tools in priority disease areas for patients and commercial benefit.
SPIRE 2: Storage platform for the Integration of Renewable Energy	Ais to increase the regions Research and Innovation (R&I) by creating a cross border Virtual Research Graduate School in the area of Mass Energy Storage (MES).
ECME: Eastern Corridor Medical Engineering Centre	Aim to collate information to use in the fight against disease. Will collect all-Ireland data on cardiovascular and respiratory disease to help develop early detection systems. It will also investigate the use of wearable technologies to record and monitor patient vital signs outside of a hospital setting.
Ulster University partnered project: North West Centre for Advanced Manufacturing	Aims to see the development of a virtual cross border Centre for Advanced Manufacturing with a focus on four thematic areas; • Sustainable Manufacturing • Additive Manufacturing • Polymers • Nano-Manufacturing
